KIRTAN LONDON'S SUMMER OF SUCCESS

This year, Kirtan London is reaching out even wider than ever before with many more outreach kirtan (music) events in London:

- 1. Mantra Lounge Kirtan evenings in Covent Garden have become weekly in frequency since the beginning of the year, with 40-50 people attending every session.
- 2. Pop-up Temple at the Wellbeing Festival (Mind Body Spirit) in May:
- over 700 people participated in kirtan and japa meditation sessions;
- over 900 prasadam sweets distributed;
- 340 medium and 90 big books on spiritual topics sold, and
- over 300 sets of japa chanting beads have been given out to eager participants.
- 3. Kirtan at Triyoga Since March 2018 the team have been running weekly sessions at Triyoga Shoreditch, one of

the branches of the prestigious yoga studio in London.

- 4. Barefoot in The Park in July, the team held a big 6 Hour Kirtan and picnic at the Hyde Park Bandstand. Over 500 people attended throughout the day with many more passers-by enjoying the kirtans.
- 5. For those who want to dive deeper into the bhakti yoga philosophy and practice, study Bhagavad Gita and learn more about kirtan and its roots, we have developed special courses, residential retreats and monthly Bhakti Sanga (reading group).

We also continue to offer our guests regular day retreats at Bhaktivedanta Manor, with tours, workshops, kirtans and talks on bhakti-yoga (the yoga of devotion), as well as the quarterly 6 Hour Kirtan at the lovely Swiss Church in Covent Garden, which attracts 120-150 people each time.



The Peace Garden

Faith representatives and well-wishers from the local area joined the former Mayor of Watford Dorothy Thornhill to open the Watford Peace Garden in Cassiobury Park. The Garden was opened with the prayers and recitals from faith representatives. Around fifty attendees gathered together at Bhaktivedanta Manor for the day-long course, which began with Ajita encouraging attendees to examine what they felt was the biggest challenge in today's society that Krishna consciousness could solve. Armed with these personal insights, participants were taught how to use that to create a wow factor around Krishna consciousness and tell people why they should care about it.

Attendees were also given a lesson in the science of persuasion, how to create content, and how to market it on social media in such a way that it leaves daily impressions on the mind.

The course was organised by Bhaktivedanta Manor's Communications team and assisted by the College of Vedic Studies.



Europe-wide communications event

Every year ISKCON devotees in the field of Communications across Europe meet together to associate, exchange ideas, share experiences and discuss common strategies

Mahaprabhu das from Radhadesh in Belgium, a dedicated leader who has been heading Communications Europe for over 10 years, was very excited to see the largest ever gathering, namely almost 50 people from 17 different countries, at this year's seminars.

Gauri das, Madhavi dasi, Devaki dasi and Radha Mohan das represented the UK.

As well as national reports, the seminar included a series of imaginative workshops and discussions on subjects including social media (by Ajita das), 'the rise of Veganism', and the role of women in ISKCON.

Madhavi dasi explained she was "very inspired to see the devotees on how they responded and participated on such a sensitive issue as the position of women in ISKCON."

Devaki dasi was selected to be a member of a team of three Directors of Communications in Europe (NGO).



Sunday 24th June marked the 50th ISKCON Ratha Yatra festival in London, whereby the deities are treated to a chariot procession through the major streets of Central London.

The grand procession left South Carriage Drive, Hyde Park, and arrived at Trafalgar Square in great devotional pomp and splendour. The famous square was brimming with people, and the festival prospered on a blisteringly hot afternoon.

"The first London Rathayatra was held in 1969," explained coordinator Titiksu das, "Six pioneering American devotees came to London to establish a temple to bring others to Krishna by the chanting of the Hare Krishna mantra.

"In the early months of 1969, before they had managed to establish a temple, Shymasundara das had carved the beautiful deities of Jagannatha, Baladeva and Subhadra. And so it was, in July that year, that the first London Rathayatra proceeded from Hyde Park to Trafalgar Square. This was a historic milestone.

"Over the years, the festival has grown in size to more than 5,000 people on the procession, 3 chariots, and 20,000 plates of meals distributed!

"For me, the 50th is an opportunity to reflect on ISKCON's mission to bring others to Krishna, and to see how we can optimise the festival to that end. Specifically, how we can better give books, prasadam (spiritual food) and Hari Nama (the chanting of Krishna's names) to the people of London."



Oxford Centre of Hindu Studies celebrates 20th Anniversary

The Oxford Centre of Hindu Studies (OCHS) celebrated its 20th Anniversary Dinner at the Oxford Town Hall, which included lecturers, academics, Research Fellows, Patrons, staff and well-wishers. 
Mantra Therapy continues to serve the UK professional community by making spirituality relevant, accessible and applicable, through its regular workshops and retreats.




Will Artificial Intelligence take over the world?

What are the long-term threats to society posed by Artificial Intelligence (AI)? Will they come to dominate us? But, even before that, can we allow them to make life-and-death decisions? What does it mean to augment humans beyond natural physical and mental limits? These were the questions posed by a multi-faith consultancy event: Faith and AI organised at the St George's Centre at Windsor Castle.

Faith representatives, including Akhandadhi das, met with Gila Sacks, the government's Director for Digital and Tech Policy along with other top academics in the field of Al. The aim was to consider the implications of the growing use of Al in many decision-making aspects of our lives. Some of these seemed alarming, and the group suggested that we may not be developing our policies of ethics quickly enough to keep pace therewith.

Many of the participants had fascinating insights, and it is hoped that in follow-up sessions a broad understanding of the unique nature of what we call human consciousness can be formulated.

- Once a month coming together to watch a movie with a spiritual theme.




Celebrating the half-man, half-lion incarnation of God
